WELCOME

We begin by acknowledging the Traditional Owners of the land on which we live, learn and grow – the Wulgurukaba and Bindal peoples. We pay our respects to Elders past and present and extend that respect to all Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. Their enduring connection to Country, culture and community continues to inspire and guide our work.

Our year at NRL Cowboys House was marked by new beginnings, sparking growth, opportunity and connection. From the opening of new spaces to new programs and cultural initiatives, we embraced change as a chance to strengthen our purpose and create pathways for the next generation of young leaders.

A major milestone in 2025 was the opening of our Graduate Campus, providing supported accommodation for our graduating students who are engaged in work or further study. This initiative ensures that our young people continue to thrive beyond school, with the support and stability they need to succeed.

That same day, we had the privilege of launching the 2025 Cowboys Indigenous design, 'Tagai' by Torres Strait Islander artist Vinson Babia, proudly featured on our House shirt design. Tagai is a powerful figure in Torres Strait Islander culture, revered as a provider of magic, a master hunter and a skilled fisherman.

In the same spirit of learning to navigate the seasons, we expanded our Paddock to Plate program in partnership with WSU Civil, which now includes a thriving garden and language project. This year, we introduced bee hives, thanks to a collaboration with a local family who own and manage them. This initiative not only supports sustainability and food education but also deepens our connection to land, language and culture.

Our cultural program expanded through the student-led introduction of the new Indigenous Sistas dance group (amazing work, Georgia!), with both Aboriginal and Torres Strait Island dancers showcasing their culture at NAIDOC Day and as part of NRL Indigenous Round.

Another exciting addition this year was The Gathering Place – our House coffee van, supported by Sun Metals and designed by Tshak. This new initiative offers students experience in customer service, teamwork and business operations, while also serving as a successful fundraising venture. It's been wonderful to see students develop new skills and confidence behind the counter, and to welcome our supporters for their caffeine fix!

To all our graduates – congratulations! Your hard work, resilience and leadership have made us proud. You are role models for your communities and ambassadors for the values we hold dear at NRL Cowboys House. We look forward to seeing the paths you forge and the impact you will make.

Thank you to our staff, partners, families and supporters for walking alongside us. Together, we continue to build a strong, culturally rich and empowering environment for our young people.

With focused time for the literacy program LEXIA, homework and assessments, and guidance from case management teachers and tutors, they benefit from a structured approach that builds confidence and independence. This supportive environment helps students stay on track in their academic journey, and we're so thankful to our teachers and tutors for guiding and inspiring our students.

PROGRAMS



WEEK 1 PROGRAM

Each term begins with a dynamic Week 1 program designed to set students up for success. Activities include team-building, community connection and targeted sessions for each year level. This year's program also aligned with Queensland Mental Health Week, focusing on *Connecting with Self, Connecting with Others and Connecting with Community*. Highlights included a robotics workshop led by QUT Indigenous Australian Engineering students, helping students build skills, resilience and meaningful connections.















YEAR 7 & 8 PROGRAM

Through our Year 7 & 8 program, students build confidence, develop life skills and form strong friendships as they explore, create and connect. The program supports personal growth, wellbeing and resilience through structured activities that help students adjust to boarding life, establish healthy habits and create lasting memories during their first years at the House.















PROGRAMS

YEAR 9 & 10 PROGRAM

Students strengthened their sense of identity, culture and purpose through the *Pathways to Pride* and *Sistas Stand Strong* programs. Using *My Deadly Book About Me*, they reflected on who they are and where they come from. The boys connected with Country at Battle Creek Station, crafting didgeridoos and learning from Traditional Owners, while the girls' camp at Alva Beach explored traditional food gathering, weaving and cultural connection. Together, they lived the House values of Family, Integrity and Resilience.

























POWER HOUR

Power Hour is a weekly physical exercise and teamwork program – a fun, high-energy fitness session designed to build strength, endurance and teamwork!

PROGRAMS

THE GATHERING PLACE - COFFEE VAN

Students transformed our coffee van into *The Gathering Place*, with vibrant artwork designed by Tshak and supported by Sun Metals, with coffee beans donated by Sodexo. Operated by students both in the community and at the House, the van provides hands-on opportunities to develop barista skills, learn how to run a small business and connect with others at events and weekly gatherings.









RAISING HORIZONS

Raising Horizons, delivered by Gunggandji Aerospace and Regional Express (REX), gave students a hands-on introduction to aviation careers, from exploring helicopters and operating drones to observing live operations in the RAAF Base Townsville Air Traffic Control tower. Through leadership sessions, insights from industry professionals and training opportunities, students discovered pathways that can turn their ambitions into real-world aviation careers.

House Supporting Partner - Career Transitions Program, Jet Zero and their partner Airbus collaborated to deliver an engaging module to the students of the Raising Horizons program. Through experiments, VR goggles, molecule building and information sessions, the students were able to gain a deeper understanding into some of the opportunities that exist in the new and exciting world of Sustainable Aviation Fuel.

Since then, they've been in high demand, performing at NAIDOC Day and dancing at Queensland Country Bank Stadium during Indigenous Round, sharing culture, pride and passion through every step.





MIRIKI PERFORMING ARTS

Our dancers proudly collaborated with Miriki Performing Arts to open the Main Stage at the 2025 Carnival on Collins in Cairns with their powerful production, *Echoes Through Time*. This storytelling journey celebrated the voices of young people, weaving together the past, present and future through themes of resilience, hope and dreams. HOUSE SHIRTS

Students, staff, and supporters have worn their 2025 House shirts with pride, celebrating the powerful story of *Tagai* – a design that embodies culture, community and the House's core values of family, integrity and resilience.

Created by Torres Strait Islander artist and House Parent Vinson Babia, *Tagai* is inspired by the great ancestral warrior and farmer of the Torres Strait. The design pays tribute to leadership, guidance and the deep connection between people and place that continues to shape the journeys of our students today.

The 2025 shirts were unveiled at a special presentation event, where the House community came together to thank Vinson for sharing his story and talent, and to acknowledge our generous uniform partners – ARC – The Australian Reinforcing Company (shirt sponsor) and Wilson Security (shorts sponsor). Their continued support helps our students represent culture and the House with confidence every day.









"TAGAI" By Vinson Babia DESIGN STORY

Tagai is a powerful figure in Torres Strait Islander culture, revered as a provider of magic, a master hunter, and a skilled fisherman. He taught us how to plant, when to plant, how to navigate the seasons, and how to travel across land and sea. The story of Tagai has been passed down through generations, shaping who we are.

The four animals—shark, turtle, dugong, and Kaigus (shovel-nosed shark)—are totems for some Torres Strait Islander communities. The shark symbolises the dry season, while the turtle and dugong represent the hunting skills Tagai taught. Kaigus is the name for the Milky Way, where Tagai is believed to travel. Four Tituil (stars) in each corner represent constellations that help us navigate the night, while the eight-point stars symbolise Tagai's sisters. The five-point stars honour the strength of our Cowboys players, linking their resilience to cultural pride.

Footprints across the Kaygusiw Usul (Milky Way) symbolise the journey of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders moving forward together with non-Indigenous Australians. The Dhoeri, a cultural symbol, is used to call upon the strength of ancestral warriors, while a Minalay Waku (woven mat) at the bottom represents the knowledge passed down through generations to us. It weaves together our cultural values, stories, and songlines, keeping them alive.

The Zugubal, constellations from the western islands of the Torres Strait, once looked human while they inhabited the island world, but were super-human in strength and performance. As stars, they guide us through the seasons, bringing rain, wind, and tides. Tagai, the leader of the Zugubal, possessed powers which enabled him to summon thunder, lightning, wind, and rain to aid the people, and he could control the moons of the sea. Tagai introduced the method of catching turtle with sucker-fish and imposed conditions on the habits and habitat of sea-creatures.

The Zugubal went up to the sky and became bright stars (Zugubal Tituil) soon after humans appeared in the Torres Strait. As stars, the Zugubal ushered in seasons, and caused rain, wind, tides, and calm. When Tagai dived into the sea" (disappeared from the night sky for a time), he splashed up water which fell as rain. When he throws his spear into the sea, this water that splashes up is the first rain of the north-west season Kuki (Northwest Wind) and Zugubal Ari starts (Monsoon season).

In the night sky, we see Tagai, holding a branch in his right hand and a spear in his left (the Southern Cross). He stands on his canoe, guiding us from March to December, helping us through our planting, hunting, and navigating the sea. When we look up, we know he is telling us the seasons. Even as we face the challenges of today, like global warming, we remember that Tagai has always been there, guiding us like a heavenly clock that never stops. His teachings live on in us, just as they have for generations.

NAIDOC & FAMILY DAY

Hundreds of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander family members travelled from 29 remote communities to join their children and our NRL Cowboys House community for the annual NAIDOC & Family Day celebration. The event holds deep significance for the House, providing a valuable opportunity for families to connect, share culture, strengthen community ties, and celebrate the achievements of the past and the bright future ahead with the theme, "The Next Generation: Strength, Vision & Legacy". This year's event was supported by the National Indigenous Australians Agency.

































































CAREER TRANSITIONS PROGRAM

Our Career Transitions team plays a vital role in guiding Year 9-12 students through one of the most important phases of their journey – preparing for life beyond NRL Cowboys House. Working closely with our Education team, families and students, the team provides personalised support to help each young person build confidence, develop essential life skills and map out meaningful post-school pathways.

This year has been one of growth and impact. From career planning to practical readiness, the Transitions team has been a consistent source of encouragement and empowerment, helping students build resilience and take ownership of their futures.

LEARNER DRIVER PROGRAM

Building confidence, independence and essential life skills, the Learner Driver Program – presented by PPQ – has been a standout Transitions initiative this year. Led by Year 13 Transitions Officer Derek, who is training to become a certified driver trainer, the program provides students with structured support and access to 10 professional driving lessons, contributing 30 hours toward their 100-hour requirement and helping them take the wheel on their journey beyond the House.



MENTORING

Through tailored mentoring and practical support, the Transitions team helps students build independence, resilience and real-world confidence as they prepare for life beyond school. Their handson approach ensures every young person feels informed and ready to take their next steps.

Focused on both personal growth and practical readiness, the program empowers students to move into adulthood with confidence and purpose, through essential support services including:

- · Post-Year 12 housing options
- · Employment matching
- · University scholarship applications
- · Financial literacy and bank account setup

CAREER EXPO

Year 10, 11 and 12 students gained valuable insights and inspiration for their future careers at this year's NRL Cowboys House Career Expo. The event offered a dynamic space to connect with industry professionals and explore pathways aligned with their interests and goals. With 20 stalls – double last year's number – students learned about the day-to-day realities of different roles, the school subjects that support their aspirations and the practical steps to get involved, leaving motivated and confident about their futures.







EMPLOYMENT PATHWAYS

Our students continue to thrive through meaningful work experience and employment opportunities, made possible by the generous support and collaboration of our House and industry partners.

FROM HOUSE TO HOME



A group of NRL Cowboys House students explored career pathways in their home regions through a Weipa career familiarisation tour, with funding from NQ Bulk Ports and supported by Sodexo. The visit gave 10 students firsthand insight into employment opportunities in Cape York, helping them prepare for meaningful, job-ready futures closer to family, community and Country.

Students toured the Bulk Ports Weipa site and met local employers to learn about remote career opportunities. The experience deepened their understanding of regional employment, strengthened community connections and identified options for our young people to build meaningful careers close to home.

Jon - Bold Spirit, Quiet Growth


Since arriving at NRL Cowboys House in Year 10, Jon Dau has grown into a young man with quiet strength and a cheeky sense of humour.


Lhere – From Quiet Beginnings to Bold Ambitions

Jackie - Style, Strength and Heart


When Jackie arrived at NRL Cowboys House in Year 10, she was quiet and unsure of what lay ahead. Before long, her confidence and creativity began to shine.

Aleeah - Bold, Loyal and Unapologetically Herself


Aleeah, affectionately known as 'Chicko', joined the House as a young Year 7 student and has grown into a strong, confident young woman.

Career goal: Electrician




Kudjarli-J Marie Nuggins

Kentaro has had an outstanding year as Indigenous School Captain, balancing leadership with cultural, sporting and community commitments.



Carleesha – Compassionate, Committed and Inspiring


